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their grant program. Our status has been moved from 9th to 4th. Randy stated that his presentation went well and they remembered the project. (See attached Large Grant Ranking Results)

Purpose of this improvement is not only safety related for operations but also for longevity, energy efficiency and cost saving measures. Ralph inquired on the sanitation/filtration system with Randy, which was rather technical. (See audio recording for dialog for the particulars of

work and systems)

It was asked if the grant will cover the proposed improvements. Randy said that it will and the City has already budgeted last year the matching funds. Timeline, there would be an award letter mid-July and then the City will do an IGA Contract with Parks and Recreation for the funds. We will have one year to execute and completion from that point would be about 90 days. Anticipated down time would be 30 days. Randy is working with Kathy Schuffelbean and North Bend Pool regarding any shut-down period. There is a plan of alternating the down time according to the work completed. Ralph asked Randy to check the black algae in the showers. Last time serviced was 2007. Bev asked how long do the UV lights last. Randy responded that it depends on the wattage. Randy reminded them that you don't have to do 100 percent of the gallon turnover but only have to do 40 percent. Turnover is 8 hours or quicker.

Randy identified two grant possibilities for the locations of the Boardwalk and Mingus Park for restrooms, trail enhancement and playground enhancement. Those grants would be either UPAR or Oregon Parks and Recreation. All these types of grants, except federal, usually engage in October with reviews sometime in January followed by a presentation and then they vote on it at that point. Randy felt we had a strong candidate in either of these because we have already updated our Parks Master Plan. Randy has already given out the entire plan and they did question the time frame listed as 2015/2016 and we haven't moved on it. Randy broke down the priorities of monies became the Mingus Pool because of the high volume of usage, the boat docks and Mingus Park as a whole as well Empire Lakes. They were very pleased with Randy and how he broke it out and they were very pleased with our Parks Master Plan but wondered how come we were so slow in moving the plan forward. Randy stated that we were very aggressive on the grants we would be getting and we knew we were going to have to make revisions. With Mingus Park at 60 acres, there are about 5 different grants alone that the park will take. The price tag being around \$10 Million to do dredging, trails, restrooms and sports park enhancement.

Grant wise, Randy felt we needed to develop a committee for the master planning regarding the Boardwalk. Once the consensus of this group comes to the reality of what they see the Boardwalk would entail, we will present it to the Council. At that point Randy can go to town finding the grants that will fit those categories. Committee wise, begin to think who needs to be on the committee? It should not be any more than 10 people total. Send your picks to Pam

EPA is changing regulations and creating more environmental red tape regarding dredging. The one benefit is this is not the bay but a pond. Randy has found a new method. This is like a small snow cat with a "snorkel" but is a submergible unit that pumps the water out into a 10,000 gallon tank that is above grade that separates the sediment and exchanges the water back into the pond. It is completely automated. Randy has found two companies one in Kentucky and the other in Indiana that will rent the unit to you and will ship them to you as well. Cost is about 60 percent less than the conventional methods. The dredge spoils can be used as long as they are tested and are less than 10 percent of heavy metals. The shell of the pond is clay and it won't be damaged during the process. The depth of the pond will be no more than 5 feet after dredging but is currently maybe 1 to 2 feet or less in some places.

 ODF&W is onboard with their support. Randy mentioned that we need to start building a list of support elements in the community and other constituents out in the community you will be talking with. We'll be sending out letters seeking support from their organizations.

Empire Lakes' bridge replacement project is \$93,000 and SWOCC has a bridge that they would like to partner with the City on the one grant. SWOCC's portion will be \$32,000 for the bridge that connects on the backside of SWOCC. The Empire Lakes is a free spanning bridge. Cost to be \$200,000 for both. This includes the needed preparation work for both bridges. The EPA grant is a good grant that would fit this with our natural resources. Asphalt, trails and restrooms will be another package in its self.

The donation of two picnic tables from Jill Hayner in honor of her deceased husband, Jim Thompson. The tables were approved under the Parks Master Plan and will be placed in John Topits Park. They will be on concrete slabs and one of the tables will have a recognition plague. The cost will be around \$3,200 that she is willing to donate. One table is an ADA table for everyone's use. Randy mentioned that the two tables she picked out are very nice.

Streetscape Plan and the Hwy 101 Beautification project was originally 12 sites and has been reduced down to 5. Council would like to do the north entrance up to the Super 8 and the south entrance and wait on all the other things. Randy will get designs and renderings done and the Streetscape Plan will be presented to Council in late July. We are mitigating the Central Docks. Rodger has worked out a pretty good deal with the owners to try to enhance and beautify the area. We've already done one-half section and the remaining is quite involved with cleanup. The purposes are for real estate curb appeal to market the property to that right person with a good desire and mindset to build something beneficial. That will move the enhancement and beautification further along.

There is serious erosion on the dike that is undermining the bulk heads of the boardwalk. The wearing surface is considered the City's responsibility and under that is that of the International Port of Coos Bay. The Port will pay for any environmental studies, design and construction with the City taking project management. The dike is approximately four feet too low of the total height of ten feet. Looking at a massive grant (FEMA) Randy will go back to FEMA who did the initial 2005 assessment.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS -

The status of the exercise equipment to go in the John Topits has been delayed. Mr. Hynes did not make his goal in raising the necessary funds but he will continue to work out in the community with his mission. The city will include the equipment in the grant for the bridges in Empire Lakes.

 The additions of ADA play equipment. Randy mentioned that you don't have to buy every component being ADA when rehabbing an existing playground. Randy talked with a local sports league member and they are aware of a group who will cover 100 percent, fully funding an ADA sports park. If we can come together on a location, the league would sponsor the group and they will come in and build. Tom mentioned something that would be really nice and worth looking at is a wheelchair glider. It allows two people to enjoy. The wheel chair slides into position and the opposite side is seating for another.

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- Our skate park needs to be updated with additional equipment to make it competitive. When we 147 enter into the new fiscal year, July 1, Randy can bring some equipment that can be easily adapted 148 and brought into the existing system but we will need to be careful other than adding the 149 equipment because we would be expanding the facility with enhancements as called out in the 150 Parks Master Plan. The design is a little bit flawed as the concrete is cracking and breaking off at 151 the lip. The seal and expansion joints are completely gone and will need to be ground out. If 152 this is not addressed soon, there could be a total failure. He would be setting monies aside next 153 year to address these issues. It was asked if bicycles have attributed to the problem. Yes, it can 154 make it very dangerous for the skate boarder. We may look down the road and develop a BMX 155 Park. Eastside would be a prime location and the costs wouldn't be much. 156 157
- It was asked if the apron up to the Boardwalk will be repaired. Randy stated this to be a prime example why there was a failure. The ODOT Rail supplies at every crossing a rubber cushion for shock absorption but the contractor failed to install. They will have to peel it back to make the install and then pour it again.








MINGUS PARK POOL FACILITY
