COOS BAY 1 2 PARKS COMMISSION MINUTES 3 **FEBRUARY 18, 2021** 4 5 The minutes of the proceedings of a regular meeting of the Parks Commission of the City of Coos Bay, Coos County, Oregon, held at 4:00 p.m. in the Council Chambers, 500 Central Avenue, Coos 6 7 Bay, Oregon. 8 Roll Call Those present were City Staff, Randy Dixon, Operations Administrator; Kelli Burnette; 9 Commissioners CoCo Sutton, Bill Davis, and Bill Otton. Attending remotely by teleconference 10 were Commissioners Ariann Lyons and Sam Crawley. Also present, attending in person, was 11 12 Henry Delaney from NW Fitness. 13 Approval of the January 21, 2021 Meeting Minutes 14 Chair Lyons called for a motion to approve the Minutes. 15 Commissioner Davis moved and Commissioner Crawley seconded the motion to approve the January 21, 2021, minutes as presented. Motion carried by unanimous vote. 16 17 Citizen Input 18 Henry Delaney, NW Fitness came forward to address the Commission in follow up to the January 21, 2021, Parks Commission Meeting at which he presented a proposal to the Commission for the 19 City to enter into a joint private/public partnership with Northwest Fitness to provide a full-size 20 baseball field at Mingus Park in exchange for a contract to facilitate activities and maintain the 21 22 grounds. Mr. Delaney stated he wanted to follow up on a few comments that were made after he left that meeting. 23 24 Mr. Delaney stated one of the first things they looked at was what it would look like in terms of 25 access if the property was maintained by a private entity and what it looks like in terms of the master plan. Mr. Delaney stated he took the time to read through the master plan and understands 26 there is not a definitive plan for a ballfield site at this time. Mr. Delaney stated in the evaluations 27 28 of the city's availabilities in the master plan it listed two full-size public fields that there is access 29 to - Southwestern Oregon Community College and Marshfield High School and that there are no other full-size ballfields in Coos Bay. Mr. Delaney commented that while those two locations are 30 31 listed as resources and facilities that are available as public parks they are not public parks. Mr. 32 Delaney stated for him to use the SOCC ballfield to host any event, it would cost him \$50 an hour, 33 which is far from public use, and the Marshfield ballfields are substantially more and they are not 34 even available. Mr. Delaney stated NW Fitness has a relationship with both of those facilities, so 35 that is not the issue it's that they can't even get access to host an event there. 36 Mr. Delaney further stated the availability of parks has changed dramatically with the addition of 37 the new little league ballfields which will he believes will add nine little league fields as early as 38 June. Mr. Delaney stated they already have fencing, everything's been cleared, they've planted 39 grass, and access to softball size and little league fields will more than double, which again goes 40 to the need for a full-size field in this area. Mr. Delaney stated that if NW Fitness were to manage 41 the Mingus Park field it would be in their best interest to create a modular based path that would 42 allow them to accommodate little league fields or a multi-purpose space.

- 43 Mr. Delaney stated the Mingus Park Ballfield is not strictly in a residential area, public events are
- held at the park all the time, there is a public pool, and the location is one block away from what 44
- 45 is designated a highway. Mr. Delaney stated he does not feel this neighborhood can be exclusively
- 46 labeled residential – it is a park that is a buffer for the industrial and residential zoning.
- 47 Mr. Delaney stated they want to host little league, softball and other events. Mr. Delaney stated
- 48 the more events they can host, the more opportunities they can give folks, the better. Mr. Delaney
- 49 stated the way they would recoup their costs would be passed along the people utilizing the field,
- 50 they do not want to charge people to come watch the events, and they want local residents to come
- 51 and participate as a recreational activity. Mr. Delaney also stated they do not want to do
- 52 concessions, it's not to their interests, is not something they want to manage, but would rather
- 53 sublet it to one of the 15 food trucks in Coos Bay trying to make a living, which is something he
- 54
- actually spoke to Debbie about, i.e., what would it look like to close down a street once every week
- 55 and host food trucks.
- 56 Mr. Delaney stated he researched the Medford Parks Department and the contract they have with
- 57 the Medford Baseball Club to manage the facilities for the city of Medford and it is zero dollars
- 58 for a ten-year annum, with a ten-year renewal for 100 years. Mr. Delaney stated this is because
- 59 they bring people into town and the baseball club is obligated to a certain number of events they
- 60 must host every year. Mr. Delaney stated they operate and maintain the facility and pay the city
- 61 nothing, and the city grants them up to a quarter million dollars a year for improvements to be
- made and still be under the private contract to facilitate the activities. Mr. Delaney further stated 62
- 63 in Bend, the baseball club pays \$1 per year on a 10-year annum.
- 64 Mr. Delaney stated they're trying to give assets to the City on a 20-year term and then bring in up
- 65 to \$2 million per year to the surrounding businesses and residents to create atmosphere, industry
- and tourism at no cost to the city. 66
- Mr. Delaney further stated he would like to continue the dialog about his proposal and if they are 67
- 68 not able to renovate the Mingus Park Ballfield, he will build a stadium somewhere, they want to
- 69 make it work, and he is a big believer in the power of baseball to bring communities together. Mr.
- 70 Delaney stated he wants to be transparent, he is a business man, he is out to make money, he has
- a love for this sport and community, which is not exclusive to him wanting to recover his 71
- 72 investments, and make sure he can pay bills. Mr. Delaney stated he believes he can pursue the
- 73 things that he loves, still provide for my family and create things for his community. Mr. Delaney
- 74 referenced their proposal and stated they would be willing to find a middle ground and mitigate
- different factors, even if that comes down to just contracting dates, but he needs a facility that can 75
- be booked out, before he can bring in 25 colliegent players every year to Coos Bay with two or 76
- three that will have the potential to be professional baseball players that will come into our 77
- 78 community, leave here and make millions of dollars, and maybe come back here and invest those
- 79 dollars. Mr. Delaney stated millions of dollars can be put into this community by a very small
- 80 project and he feels the best way to do it is in a public/private partnership and make those changes
- to a leased space. 81
- 82 Mr. Delaney thanked the Commission for their time and invited them to contact him with any
- 83 questions.
- 84 Chair Lyons thanked Mr. Delaney for providing the additional information and stated she looks
- for to reviewing and discussing the proposal further. 85

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Mingus Park Skate Park – Requests to Allow Bikes and Scooters

- 87 Staff Member Dixon reported that he has received numerous requests to allow bikes and scooters
- 88 at the Mingus Park Skateboard Park and that he wanted to get input from the Commission as to
- 89 whether or not they want to allow bikes and scooters of leave the rules and regulations as they are
- 90 which only allows skateboards. Staff Member Dixon stated our master plan does mention the need
- 91 for a BMX track and there are locations one could be developed, specifically in the same location
- as the sports complex that is currently being discussed.
- 93 Staff and the Commission discussed damage caused by bikes and scooters, recent volunteer work
- ompleted at the skatepark to repair damages done by bikes and scooters, the fact is was designed
- 95 for skateboards only, and the obvious need for a BMX track in the City.
- 96 Staff and the Commission discussed the fact that the current master plan does call for a BMX track,
- 97 which could be part of the sports complex development the Commission is currently discussing,
- and that the existing skateboard park should remain for skateboards only.
- 99 Commissioner Otton stated he concurs with Staff and that from past experience there's only one
- park he can think of that tried a multiuse skateboard park and that was Grants Pass and it didn't go
- 101 well. Commissioner Otton further stated that when the Commission was first looking into the
- skateboard park, every other multiuse park they spoke to was adamant about the park being for
- skateboards only. Commissioner Otton stated he believes the Mingus Park Skateboard Park should
- remain 100% skateboards only.
- Staff and the Commission discussed including the BMX track as part of the new sports complex
- 106 could be easier to design and wouldn't be a huge cost factor.
- 107 A discussion commenced regarding the fact that most kids/people follow the no bike/scooter rules,
- but some do not. Staff Member Dixon acknowledged the volunteer who does the repairs and
- upkeep and stated he can't continue to repair things that people tear up where it's not suitable to
- be in. Staff Member Dixon stated there is a need for a bike track, that he has spoken to 10 families
- on the phone recently that would be very supportive, and he thinks it should be part of a
- development plan of another facility, such as the ballfields the Commission is considering and
- keep the current skateboard parks for skateboards only as the rules outline.
- 114 Chair Lyons asked if there were any other comments. There were none.

115 Proposed Sport Complex Location Discussion

- 116 Staff Member Dixon reported there has been discussion about the proposed sports complex
- location being at Empire Lakes and there appears to be a large "pull" for it and that he has been
- asked to look into that possibility. Staff Member Dixon also reported there is a possibility the
- National Guard will be vacating their facility in Empire and if that is true it is possible they would
- offer that property to the local municipality. Staff Member Dixon commented that would be a
- prime location for a building and facility for our parks, not only a sports complex, but maybe a
- dog park and/or bike track. Staff Member Dixon commented there could be a lot of potential there
- and if the City already owns the property and there is a LWCF grant, LWCF would look at the
- and it the city directly with the property and there is a two grant, Ewel would look at the
- 124 property as match for the bigger picture and if the National Guard also donated their property to
- the City it would solidify the grant moving forward on a much larger scale.
- 126 Chair Lyons stated that is interesting and exciting information and that anything that could increase
- the use of Empire Lakes might help mitigate the other issues out there.

- 128 Staff Member Dixon stated he wanted the Commission to be aware that City Council might discuss
- 129 the possibility of the sports complex location being at Empire Lakes at the February 23rd work
- 130 session, along with the NW Fitness proposal.

131 **Commissioner Closing Comments**

- 132 Staff Member Dixon reported the SRTS project should be wrapping up next week, he will be
- 133 asking Rodger Craddock about hosting a ribbon cutting ceremony and will keep the Commission
- 134 informed.
- 135 Chair Lyons asked if the City will be doing an Arbor Day Activity. Staff Member Dixon stated
- 136 yes, we can do one this year wearing facemasks and adhering to social distancing. Staff Member
- Dixon proposed incorporating the activity into the current 4th Street project which will have tree 137
- wells opened up and ready for planting around Arbor Day which is April 30th. Staff further 138
- 139 commented we can work with the contractor and get some volunteers. Chair Lyons stated she
- 140 thinks that sounds great.
- 141 Chair Lyons asked if there were any additional comments.
- 142 Commissioner Sutton stated she really likes the Arbor Day activity idea and the idea of a multiuse
- 143 sports complex at Empire Lakes.
- 144 Commissioner Crawley stated everything discussed sounds good to him.
- 145 Chair Lyons stated she is excited there is so much renewed interest in our outdoor spaces/parks.
- Staff Member Dixon asked how many Commissioners would be attending the February 23rd work 146
- 147 session with City Council. Four Commissioners reported they would be attending.
- 148 Adjourn
- 149 There being no further business to come before the Parks Commission, by consensus of the Parks
- Commission, Chair Lyons adjourned the meeting at 4:31 p.m. 150
