
theme would be "Hear the Beep Where you Sleep, Every Bedroom Needs a Working Smoke Alarm". According to NFPA, roughly half of home fire deaths occur between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m. or when most people are sleeping. Many studies have proven that working smoke alarms in homes can save lives. Current recommendations by NFPA and other safety organizations are pushing for more smoke alarms in homes as well as more awareness regarding smoke alarms. The appropriate number of working smoke alarms is so important that this is the second year in a row that NFPA is pushing a smoke alarm based message with the 2014 message being "Smoke Alarms Save Lives: Test Yours Every Month".

This year two firefighters from Coos Bay Fire Department were selected to act as Fire Service Escorts. The Coos Bay Volunteer Firefighters Association have underwritten the traveling expenses for the Escorts. Family Escorts represent the fire service family as a whole and create a lasting impression. The escorts who have accompanied families to weekend events in the past describe it as an unforgettable experience.
