

City Manager's Office (541) 269-8912 **25 YEARS OF SERVICE!** – November marks 25 years of employment for Lt. Randy Miles (Coos Bay Fire) and Sgt. Robert Lounsbury (Coos Bay Police).

Randy Miles started as a Volunteer Firefighter as soon as he was old enough to serve. After graduating from Marshfield in 1981, he moved to Portland and received an Associate Degree in Radio Production Technology from Mt Hood Community College. Randy returned to Coos Bay and continued serving as a Volunteer Firefighter. He was hired as a career Firefighter/Engineer in November of 1990. In July of 1992, Randy was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant. Randy was promoted again in April of 1995 to the rank of Captain. When the department restructured in 2002, Randy chose to revert to the rank of Lieutenant.





During his career, Randy has been very active in leadership in both the Volunteer Association and the Firefighter's Union (IAFF 2935). He currently serves as the Union President. Randy has been involved in most of the department's programs from fire prevention and Public Education to extinguisher maintenance, fire inspections, hazardous materials team, and uniform coordinator. Have you ever wondered who coordinates the 4<sup>th</sup> of July firework show? Randy has been the director of that event for the last 20 years.



Like Randy, Robert Lounsbury began serving the City long before he was hired as a full time employee. Prior to being hired in November of 1990, Robert served eight years as an Explorer and one year as a Reserve Police Officer. Robert graduated from North Bend High School and later earned a Bachelor of Science degree from Eastern Oregon University.





During his career, Robert has served as a Patrol Officer, DARE Officer, School Resource Officer, Patrol Sergeant, and Detective Sergeant.

In addition to his dedication to the Police Department and the community, Robert has also been a long time contender as a high level athlete completing in a variety of sporting events to include competitive water skiing, duathlons, and triathlons, and three Ironman events.
