#### Tsunami Awareness – Blue Line Project

The City of Coos Bay was one of four coastal cities chosen by the Oregon Office of Emergency Management (OEM) to participate in the Blue Line Project. This is a Tsunami awareness campaign that has had success in New Zealand. The program incorporates a blue stripe and signage placed directly onto the road surface at the estimated high-water mark to remind residents and visitors of potential Tsunami hazard areas. The Oregon Department of Geology and Mineral Industries (DOGAMI) has calculated what low elevation areas would likely be at risk of Tsunami wave and flooding. Their maps are available at City Hall, the Coos Bay Library, the Fire Station, and online at www.oregontsunami.org. Coos Bay held a Tsunami evacuation drill on March 11th to commemorate the 5th anniversary of the magnitude 9.0 earthquake and subsequent tsunami that struck the Japanese coastline.

The thick blue lines and signs were installed this week by the Street Department staff. The stripe and signs, similar to our crosswalks, are a thick decal that is melted with a torch into the asphalt of the street. This installation process securely sticks the sign to the pavement, and the decals should last up to four times longer than conventional painted signs. This special material contains small glass beads that make the signs reflective. The five locations for the signs are:

- Newmark Avenue between Wall and Wasson Street
- Koos Bay Blvd. at 8th Street
- Central Ave. between 9th and 10th St.
- Hall St. between 4th and 5th St., and
- 6<sup>th</sup> Avenue just north of E Street

These locations were chosen because they represent main routes leading out of

the inundation zone and to the identified assembly areas. The other three communities participating in this OEM Blue Line project include Florence, Reedsport, and Gold Beach.



Rhonda Wilson began her career with the Coos Bay Police Department in September 1985 as a part time dispatcher, and she moved into a full time position in May of 1986. During Rhonda's **30 plus years** with the Coos Bay Police Department, she has accumulated over 1,400 training hours; and she holds a Basic, Intermediate, and Advanced Certifications through DPSST.

Over the years, there have been six different police chiefs that have had the honor of being told "Where to go and what to do" by Rhonda as she dispatched them on calls for service. She is one of the centers training dispatchers, and she has been instrumental in seeing that the same



high standards continue to be in place as new dispatchers are hired and trained.

In addition to receiving numerous department awards and citations, Rhonda has also received a "Life Saving Award" in 2014, and a "Distinguished Service Award" in 2010 from the Oregon Peace Officers Association. In 2007, Rhonda was one of the employees who was recognized by former Chief Eura Washburn as one "Employees of the Year" in the department for her dedicated service to the citizens of Coos Bay.

Tia began her law enforcement career while she was a student at the North Bend High School by first joining the Coos County Explorer program as well as a work experience student in the dispatch center at North Bend Police Department. After turning 21, Tia became a Reserve Police Officer with the City of Eastside and then with the Coos Bay Police Department when Eastside was annexed by the City of Coos Bay.



In August of 1980, Tia was hired as a full time dispatcher with the North Bend Police Department, and she worked in the center until April of 1985 when she was hired by the Coos Bay Police Department. In her 31 years at Coos Bay, she has served in several capacities; but she has supervised the North Coos 911/CBPD Communications Center for last 25 years.

In 1993, Tia was named the Oregon State Telecommunicator of the year, 1997 she received the Oregon Instructor of the Year Award through DPSST as well as many more awards and certificates throughout her career.

Tia recently announced her pending retirement in June of this year, and she is looking forward to spending quality time with husband Ron a North Bend Police Department Captain, her three children, and eight grandchildren.
