



On the Council's Agenda...

At last week's Council Work Session, the City Council reviewed renderings from Greenworks, Inc. regarding proposed visual improvements to the City's Hwy 101 gateways (by Fred Myers on the south end of the City and just north of Ace Hardward). Based on Council's review, the design plans will be refined and reviewed. It's the Council's goal to complete the review, seeks bids, award the contract, and have the work completed before the end of the summer.


The City Council also reviewed a concept proposal for a mural project honoring Steve Prefontaine. The proposed site is in the Pedway on the southern wall where the fund raising obelisk that illustrated the fundraising goal for the Egyptian Theatre project was painted a couple of years ago. Staff is working with the Prefontaine Foundation and Linda Prefontaine, Steve's sister, on this exciting project. The Council is in support of the project, and they are in hopes that the mural project can be completed just before or around the time of this year's Prefontaine Memorial Run in late September.

At next week's meeting, April 4th, the Council will receive a presentation on Coos Bay School District's May 2017 bond measure to provide capital projects to our local school facilities. At the end of the presentation, the City Council will

"Hero of the Month"

Farmers agent Kim Wesman has made it her mission to thank our local heroes (police officers, firefighters, and teachers) who make a positive difference in our community. Each month Kim selects five local heroes to honor, and she uses nominations from the community to help her in the selection process. Last month, Reserve Officer Luke McGriff was chosen as the "Hero of the Month" recipient based on the following nomination which was submitted by his wife:

"One definition provided in the dictionary for "Hero" is "somebody admired for outstanding qualities or achievements". Ask a child their definition of a hero, and the answer will most likely be a list of characters like, Superman, Batman, Captain America, etc. My hero may be a combination of the dictionary's version and a child's. I know this amazing, almost super natural man that can somehow manage to wear any magical hat required of him.

Most people know him as Luke; my kids call him Dad. He could be the estimator assisting with a home owner or construction manager's project with electrical design for the power company, or maybe he is helping restore the power from a recent storm. Then when he's not wearing one of those hats, it is probably the one labeled "Coos Bay Police".

For the past 3½ years, Luke has donated his time to volunteer as a Reserve Police Officer with the Coos Bay Police Department. This is not a simple task. This required him to complete course work at the local college prior to being released to the field. He now attends monthly meetings, complete trainings with the full-time officers in areas covering tactical training, driving/operating a police vehicle and qualifies at the shooting range. This all requires a minimum of 20 hours a month.

The 20 hour minimum is just that. Often Luke's volunteer hours exceed the required 20, other times it is just met. These hours are all in addition to working a regular 40 hour a week job, which often requires additional call-outs in the wee hours due to power outages. Since he has the full-time job and a family at home, Luke often volunteers during the night to patrol our wonderful little town of Coos Bay. He is selfless, does not require praise for his work but truly enjoys what he does. Honestly, he would probably ask me not to nominate him if he knew I was submitting this, simply because he does not need praise to fuel him. But I can't let it go unsaid. So when I think of my nominated hero, Luke McGriff. I consider him our Batman."




Luke has chosen The Oregon Fallen Badge Memorial Fund as his Charity

Progress continues on the new wastewater treatment plant...

An additional 420 cubic yards was poured this week for the second of what will be 10 needed for the foundation / bottom of a treatment tank. A total of 630 cubic yards has been poured to date. Fun Fact: Some people may not know that I cubic yard measures 3'x3'x3' in volume. Picture a standard sized, top loading washing machine in your mind. A washing machine is roughly the size of a cubic yard. Imagine what 630 washing machines stacked on top of each other and side by side would look like. 630 cubic yards is a lot of concrete!!!





City Clean Up Day (Coos Bay and North Bend):

The annual City Clean Up Day is scheduled for Saturday, April 22 from 10am to 3pm. Residents of Coos Bay and North Bend can donate at least 4 items of food or \$4 for the South Coast Food Share and then drop off up to 4 cans (35-gallon size) of household garbage. Recyclables are welcome, but no tires, appliances, furniture, metal, or hazardous materials will be accepted. Garbage drop-off is limited to residents of Coos Bay & North Bend.

United Way Day of Caring will helping out community members, such as elderly or disabled persons, by picking up garbage at their homes and bringing it to a drop-off site. South Coast Food Share, North Bend Presbyterian Church, and the Salvation Army will be helping to collect donations and direct traffic at the drop-off sites. Les' Sanitary Service, Coos Bay service and Sanitary North Bend Sanitation will be accepting the garbage and providing the collection equipment.

Last year we accepted over 19 tons of garbage and collected over 1,000 pounds of food for local food banks. This is our 10th year, so we hope to make this event even bigger and better than ever!











HOW TO BRING YOUR HAZARDOUS PRODUCTS TO THE EVENT:

Products should be left in their original container. Label materials not in their original container only if you are sure of the contents.

Please do not mix products together. Dangerous reactions can occur when some materials are mixed.

Make sure containers are properly sealed so they won't leak or spill. If a container is leaking, secure it in a secondary leak-proof container.

Transport in a sturdy box or tub in your trunk or truck bed.

Please do not put items in plastic bags.

Bring in any of the items listed and we will dispose of them for you in a manner friendly to the environment.



Leaf Bag

Coos Bay Brush Pick-Up

May 1st



- 1 pile per address, no more than 5 feet in length.
- Brush should be next to curb, away from any overhead obstacles, fire hydrants, or other obstructions.
- No materials which are not appropriate for grinding. No grass clippings, sod, dirt, loose leaves, plastic bags, baling twine, rope, or non-organic materials.
- Pile must not exceed 5 cubic yards. For larger piles, call Les' Sanitary or Coos Bay Sanitary to make arrangements to pick it up, cost is \$11.50 per cubic yard.

Items to put in your pile:

- ♦ Brush
- Leaves in paper bags
- ⋄ Tree limbs ⋄ Blackberry vines

Brush pick-up is a great time to make sure your property complies with city code by keeping the streets and sidewalks clear and safe.

Coos Bay Municipal Code 8.10.060 states:

- The abutting property owner is responsible for keeping streets and sidewalks clear.
- Trees and bushes must be trimmed so that any overhanging portions are at least eight (8) feet above the sidewalk and at least fourteen (14) feet above the roadway.
- · Any dead or decaying tree must be removed if it is a hazard to the public or to persons or property on or near the property.
