CITY BUDGET FOR FY 2002-2003 FACES SERIOUS CHALLENGES - Two weeks ago City Manager Bill Grile informed the City Council that Coos Bay's budget for next fiscal year will be facing serious revenue shortfalls and that the Council and Budget Committee will have some hard work to do this spring as options are identified and evaluated, and decisions made about how best to maintain existing services and programs. Tuesday night the city manager gave the Council a detailed briefing with a PowerPoint presentation to help get a better understanding about how the challenges have arisen and what their impacts mean. Melanie Johnston from the Police Dept. read a prepared statement to the Council addressing a series of concerns about the shortfalls and Randy Miles, President of the Coos Bay Fire Fighters Association, added to these with additional questions and advice for the Council. Annette Miles and Bob Miles added their thoughts as well, as did AFSCME union representative Neil Bednarczyk. The Coos Bay Police Officers Association was well represented at Tuesday evening's Council meeting and although the Association had issued a press release with concerns about the proposed layoff of three dispatchers, no additional thoughts about the budget shortfall were expressed to the Council that night.

<u>NEWMARK & SHONEMAN UPDATE</u> - The Newmark and Shoneman crosswalk hatching was completed this week. City crews placed the new neon green and white hot tape in each of the crosswalks across Newmark. With the addition of the new neon signing, the intersection is marked very well for the traveling public. When you have a chance drive by and take a look. The City will be placing this tape at other selected crosswalks around town.

BRUSH IN THE RIGHT OF WAY - Spring is on the way and the vegetation along the right of ways is beginning to grow and cause problems for pedestrians and cars. Remember vegetation along the right of way out to the curb or edge of pavement/edge of gravel that is the abutting your property is your responsibility to keep trimmed back. Vegetation overhanging sidewalks must be kept trimmed to a height of eight (8) feet above the sidewalk and twelve (12) feet over the street. Being proactive will save the City time and money by not having to investigate complaints about overgrowing vegetation and help out the drivers and pedestrians who use the street and/or sidewalk in front of your property.

MINGUS PARK POOL TO CLOSE FOR MAINTENANCE- The Mingus Park pool will be closed April 1st through April 5th for routine maintenance and safety inspections. Each year the City is required by the State to open the boiler up for inspection. At the same time, city crews remove and place new sand in the filters that the pool water goes through. The City also will be placing a new chemical controller that monitors and injects the chemicals into the water to keep the water at a safe level for the swimmers. During the closure, the City also will replace a valve and other miscellaneous tubing that is beginning to leak and show signs of wear. It is anticipated that the pool will be up and running by Saturday, April 6th barring any significant problems/complications with the closure.

THE LADY WASHINGTON IS RETURNING - The Lady Washington is returning to Coos Bay for a another visit. She will be in port from April 20th to May 5th and will be moored at the Coos Bay City Dock along Highway 101. Stay tuned for more information on the activities that the ship will have when in port.
