PUBLIC FORUM TO BE HELD ON GAS PIPELINE AND STATE CRIME MEASURES – A Public Forum featuring the County Gas Pipeline Bond Measure and State crime Measures will be held Monday, October 11th at 7 p.m. at the Coos Bay City Hall. Nikki Whitty, Coos County Commissioner, and Deborah George Wright, Associate Dean Professional and Technical Education of Southwestern Oregon Community College. will support the proposed pipeline. Bobbie Stewart and Peter Ryan will present the opposing position. Paul Burgett, Coos County District Attorney and Katie Dunn, Southwestern Oregon Public Defender, will present the supporting and opposing issues of State Measures Nos. 70,71,73,75. The opportunity for written questions from the audience will follow the presentations.

<u>TRADITIONAL ARTS OF THE OREGON COUNTRY" EXHIBITS AND PROGRAMS HOSTED BY THE LIBRARY</u> — Special exhibits are currently shown at the library as part of a special grant program through the Oregon Historical Society's Oregon Folklife Program. The Program presents Oregon's folk arts through a traveling photo exhibit showing practicing Oregon artists and their work. Coos Bay is one of twelve Oregon libraries participating in the grant project. Other displays in library exhibit cases feature quilts by members of Coos Sand 'n Sea Quilters that are based on traditional quilt patterns as well as several pieces of the Norwegian folk art of rosemaling by Gold Beach artist Joanne Fedje. The three exhibits give current interpretations of traditional folk arts that have become part of Oregon's cultural heritage. All three can be seen in the library throughout the month of October. Two programs are part of the grant project: 1) "Scraps of Memory" writing workshop will be given Saturday, October 9th, by writer and teacher Melissa Madenski, co-sponsored by Friends of the Library. <u>LIBRARY LAUNCHES INDEPENDENT READING PROGRAM</u> — Here is the chance for children in grades K-12 to win a great prize during Coos Bay Public Library's "Hooked on Books" independent reading program. JOHN TOPITS PARK TOUR — Community Services Director Bill Finney, Operations Administrator Steve Doty and Parks Foreman Phil Christiana toured John Topits Park with John to see what the City can do to help the volunteers that work in the Park every Saturday. John has several visions on cleaning up certain areas to open the forest areas for better visual effect. Most of that work would be to remove limbs and blown down trees to make the area more user friendly. There are some very peaceful areas off the main trail for visitors to see. The trails are primitive, but are walkable by most individuals. The Shutters Creek inmates could be utilized for most of work in clearing and staff could haul the brush away.

<u>DOWNTOWN PARKING DECISION</u> — At its Tuesday evening meeting this week, the City Council approved a suspension of parking time limit enforcement in all municipal parking lots in the downtown area. Enforcement of parking time limits for on-street parking will continue — only parking lots are affected by the Council's decision. Parking permits already purchased for the October through December time period will be credited for those payments. The Council will review the effects of this decision after the first of the new year.

<u>FIRE DAMAGE AT MINGUS PARK POOLHOUSE</u> – Early Wednesday morning a construction worker engaged in the poolhouse re-construction project noticed smoke in one of the yet to be completed rooms of the building. The Coos Bay Fire Department responded and found lots of smoke, but very little actual fire. Lots of insulation was damaged by the smoke and minor damage to some wood framing was sustained. The

architect for the project is examining what will be required to reapir the damage; estimates are that the project will not be significantly delayed. The cause of the fire is being investigated by the Coos Bay Fire Department.

<u>BUILDING CODES DIVISION MEETING OCTOBER 21st</u> – BCD will be conducting a series of open forums across the state to discuss the building codes system in Oregon; its statutory framework, policy boards and state and local administrative structure. Oregon's building codes system has been in place since 1973 and could benefit from open and frank discussions regarding its strengths, weaknesses and opportunities for improvement. The meeting for this area will be held October 21, at City Hall in the Council Chambers located at 500 Central Ave. Coos Bay OR. The meeting will begin at 7pm. EPA BROWNFIELD GRANT -- Oct. 1st marked the beginning of the new Federal fiscal year and the official start-up of the Brownfield Development Pilot Project. The pilot, or redevelopment area, involving 30 separate ownerships has been identified as the Waterfront Heritage District and involves properties along N. Front Street just north of the present Coos Bay Boardwalk. The City is now seeking a qualified environmental consulting firm to assist it in identifying potential barriers to redevelopment. There has been a tremendous response to the Request for Proposals currently being advertised.
