BURGER KING PRAISES EXCEPTIONAL SERVICE BY TWO COOS BAY MANAGERS - "I'm not at all surprised but extremely pleased to receive the message," said city manager Bill Grile this week upon getting a personal call from Burger King's regional manager, Joe Kuharik. The message was the strongest possible praise for Coos Bay Fire Chief Stan Gibson and Building Administrator Joe McClay. What did they do? "Way above and beyond the call of duty ... way above and beyond!" proclaimed Kuharik as he expressed his appreciation for the weekend help these two guys provided to the Newmark Avenue Burger King in order to get it up and running after a second untimely and most unfortunate fire. "I have to be a little careful in how I say this," said Kuharik, "because we do business in lots of cities in Southwestern Oregon ... but what Stan and Joe did was nothing short of exceptional service," he stressed. Gibson and McClay made themselves available most of Saturday to help resolve permit issues, provided Burger King with their home phone numbers and even offered to assist last Sunday if needed. CITY COUNCIL ENCOURAGES COUNTY COMMISSIONERS TO MOVE AHEAD WITH

PROPOSED NUISANCE ORDINANCE - This week the City Council approved a letter encouraging the County Commissioners to move ahead with its proposed nuisance ordinance. The letter expresses strong support for action to deal with blight in the urbanizing areas on the outskirts of the city limits, and along corridors traveled by tourists visiting the area. "Once you have further refined the proposed ordinance into a workable document, we would wholeheartedly support a <u>countywide</u> public advisory election on the proposal," writes Mayor Joe Benetti for the City Council. "If crafted well, we're confident it would enjoy overwhelming public support," the letter concludes. COUNTY SOLID WASTE COMMITTEE CONTINUES TO PONDER OPTIONS FOR **BEAVER HILL** - Coos County's Solid Waste Advisory Committee met Wednesday evening at the Coos Bay Public Library and continued to ponder options for improving the efficiency and economics of the Beaver Hill Disposal Facility. The goal is to make the facility more economically competitive with other disposal options. Knowing that disposing local garbage at a landfill in Corvallis offers the potential of savings in one sense but environmental costs (meaning: dollars to meet environmental requirements) in another has kept the committee looking for options. One of these is burning tires, and that possibility seems "very doable," according to facility manager Steve Allen. Recent tests show that getting the state to approve a permit for this "shouldn't be too difficult," according to Allen. Disposal of medical wastes offers still more potential, as does taking in Curry County garbage and one or two other ideas intended to increase volume at the facility, and thereby lower incremental processing costs. Before next month's meeting, John Stephens, Will Wright and Steve Allen plan to get together and draft a request for proposals to seek the services of a consultant needed to determine if power can be economically generated from the facility's burners. If so, this would be a major step in securing a longer life for the troubled facility. Without better economics, Beaver Hill's days seem numbered. The committee's next meeting is September 5th.

WELCOME TO THE BAY AREA CHIEF SCIBELLI! - City manager Bill Grile and Coos Bay Police Chief Chuck Knight were on hand at Wednesday afternoon's open house at North Bend City Hall to welcome new NBPD Chief Stephen Scibelli to his new post. 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<u>HISTORIC DESIGN REVIEW COMMITTEE</u> - Looking to volunteer in your community? FIREFIGHTERS RECEIVE CERTIFICATIONS - Congratulations go out to Coos Bay Volunteer Firefighters Chuck Hanners, Christian Lorenz and Ben Ferguson who recently received their Basic Emergency Medical Technician certifications from the State of Oregon Health Division. The EMT Basic certification is achieved after taking a 2-term class at SWOCC and passing a written and hands-on practical exam. The fire department has responded to over 900 calls so far in 2001. Over 65% of these calls have been requests for medical assistance. With this certification the fire department will be better able to meet this critical need for our community.

REMOVAL ALONG SOUTH 4TH STREET - The City Street crew removed seven trees along South 4th Street this week to prepare for the asphalt pavement overlay work planned for that area later this month. The roots from these trees have lifted the sidewalk and street. The roots under the street will be removed by the contractor when the work begins. The entire project will place an overlay on South 4th Street from Anderson Avenue to Elrod Avenue and on Elrod Avenue from Broadway to South 4th Street. <u>CITY HALL GETS SPRUCED UP</u> - The Coos Bay City Hall planter area along 6th Street is getting a major cleanup job.
