<u>CITIZEN POLICE ACADEMY UPDATE</u> - The Citizen Police Academy in which Coos Bay is cosponsoring with North Bend Police and the Coos County Sheriff's Department met at Southwestern Oregon Community College this week. Participants from all regions of the County are participating in the eight week program where they will be introduced to the challenges facing law enforcement. Academy graduation is set for April 3, 2002.

<u>FBI VISITS COOS BAY</u> - Charlie Matthews, Supervisor of the Portland Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and Mike Morrow, Supervisory FBI Agent from Eugene were in Coos Bay this week to meet with Police Chiefs in matters affecting the South Coast, including inter-agency cooperation and terrorism task force involvement. The South Coast is fortunate to have a strong working relation with the Federal Bureau of Investigations and their agents assigned to the Portland and Eugene offices.

**STORM RECOVERY - COOS BAY POLICE UPDATE-** Police Chief, Chuck Knight, expressed his gratitude for the quick response by department staff during the storm last week which knocked out power and snarled traffic in Coos Bay. Off duty officers and 9-1-1 Dispatchers called the department to offer assistance as soon as the storm hit. The task of locating additional staff to handle traffic control and answer the multitude of incoming telephone calls was made easy in light of the community spirit displayed by department staff.

COOS COUNTY EMERGENCY OPERATIONS CENTER ACTIVATED- The Coos Bay City Hall Emergency Operations Center (EOC) was activated during the storm last week. The center which is activated during disasters or other extreme emergencies to coordinate emergency response as needed. The EOC was activated within minutes of the storm and began shut down three hours later when emergency units were cleared from critical tasks. The final shut down of the EOC was several hours later when the immediate emergency subsided. The EOC was staffed by members of Coos Bay Police, Fire, and Public Works, and members of the Coos County Radio Club and Southwest Oregon Repeaters Association and City Manager Bill Grile. It is unknown if any other municipality or if the county activated an Emergency Operations Center during or immediately following the storm.

<u>HIGH SCHOOL ART COMPETITION WINNERS</u> – On Friday evening, January 25<sup>th</sup>, the Coos Art Museum and Southwestern Oregon Community College hosted the opening of the seventh annual high school art competition, Vision 2002 at the Coos Art Museum. <u>WHEN IT RAINS IT STORMS</u> - While attempting to repair a crushed storm drain at Norman Street's intersection with Newmark Avenue last week, JBS Construction, Inc. encountered much more than they bargained for. Traffic control was set up on the busy roadway, pumps were at work to make headway against torrential rains, and utility companies were standing by to lend a hand. As the 11-foot deep hole mushroomed, the wind swept in and the crew scrambled to button things down for the duration of the storm. Fortunately, the day following the storm was a beautiful day in which to finish the repair. A special thanks is due OMI staff and the contractors that come to the City's rescue during emergency times such as this.

**RAISE THE ROOF** - On Tuesday evening the Planning Commission approved the site plan for a covered play area for Eastside Elementary School. The metal roof structure will be "azure blue" to coordinate with a color of the school. By giving proper attention to the exterior of the structure during the site plan review, the aesthetic quality of our schools, and the neighborhood where it is located, is protected and enhanced.

INSURANCE PREMIUMS EXPECTED TO INCREASE - The city manager and department heads meet on a monthly basis with the city's insurance agent of record. During this month's meeting it was reported that insurance premiums for property and health are expected to increase 30 percent and liability and auto are expected to increase 20 percent next year. The increases are due in part to the World Trade Center attack and the Enron issue. Both situations have impacted the insurance business greatly and businesses will not be the only ones faced with increases to insurance increases; as private citizens we will also see increases in our personal policies. City staff remain diligent in finding ways to improve our risk management procedures and keep the city's claims to a minimum which in turn helps keep our premiums down.

<u>ART EXHIBITS</u> - The exhibit for February by Bandon artist Victoria Tierney showcases the Chinese "Year of the Horse." It also previews upcoming events at Coos Art Museum. Coos Sand 'n Sea Quilters will present the March exhibit, with quilts large and small on the walls, plus displays in the lobby cases.
