**HAWAIIAN CHIEFTAIN COMING TO PORT** – The “Grand Arrival” of the Hawaiian Chieftain is scheduled for 12 noon on Friday, barring bad weather. The tall ship will be in port August 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> at the City Dock. Dockside tours will be free of charge on Friday from 2 p.m. to 6 p.m. and there will be two sails on Saturday at 10 a.m. and at 2 p.m. Cost of the sail is \$40 for adults and \$20 for children 12 years of age and under. The Hawaiian Chieftain is a 103' square topsail ketch which was built by the Lahaina Welding Company upon the island of Maui in the Hawaiian Islands. At her launch on June 12, 1988, half the town of Lahaina turned out to watch two D-9 Caterpillars pull the boat to the ocean through a freshly dug trench of salt water and sand. Hawaiian Priests and ancient invocations accompanied the launching, complete with a huge floral wreath draped across her bow. She sailed to Tahiti on her maiden voyage. The Hawaiian Chieftain is built in the style of a 1790's era northern European trading vessel and is constructed of steel with teak trim and mahogany paneling.

Coast Guard approved for 47 passengers with a captain and crew of six, she is outfitted with twin diesel engines that have a combined total of 500 horsepower. Weighing 64 tons, the draft is only 6 feet, making her highly maneuverable in shallow waters. She is equipped with a working sailing rig of a design taken from coastal trading vessels used in northern Europe. The rig follows the traditional layout and fittings that had become the height of design during the great period of sailing ships at the first half of the 19th century. Having over 90 control lines to be worked, there is much to do aboard this ship to keep her on course. No push buttons or winches are used to control the sails, all the lines must be heaved through block and tackles, and sweated around belaying pins.

The Hawaiian Chieftain is now based in Sausalito from April through October each year, and for the past six years has toured southern California with the tallship Lady Washington in the winter. She utilizes a variety of programs designed to develop self-esteem for youth in a challenging environment. In the past six years, over 34,000 students stepped back into the Age of Exploration through our "Voyages of ReDiscovery" 4th and 5th grade hands-on-history program which focuses on the the exploration of the west coast during the 1790's. Voyages of ReDiscovery is offered in the San Francisco Bay from April through October and in ports as far south as San Diego in the winter time. A Sausalito based, week-long day camp "Buccaneers & Explorers Camp" aboard the Chieftain is available for youth ages 9 to 12 years. The summertime “Voyagers Camp”, for youth ages 13 to 16 years, is an expeditionary longboat program. The boats, two 25 foot Crotch Island pinky schooners and a 23 foot Royal Navy launch, are sailed on the San Francisco Bay and the

Sacramento / San Joaquin River Deltas. These programs focus on empowering the students through education, experience and exploration.

The project is in the first year of a three year grant to reduce methamphetamine use our community. The success of the program is becoming recognized by others as was demonstrated by one person traveling to the Bay Area from Seattle to see what we are doing here on the South Coast after hearing about the project.
