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CITY OF COOS BAY ECONOMIC FOCUS GROUP MEETING – Tuesday morning Mayor Verger and the City Council will be meeting with a short list of local economic development proponents to learn perspectives and hear ideas about how the City might increase its job creation efforts. The breakfast meeting will be held at The Red Lion starting at 7:00 AM. Invited panelists will include: Greg Stevens, Guy Williams, Jon Richards, Glen Thomas, Rod Stalcup, Larry Hink, Hal Graham, John Stephens, Howard McKee, Bill Lansing, Andy Nasburg, Dale Jessup, Pete Johnson, Harry Davis and John Sweet. The City hopes the input will help identify Coos Bay's niche in the local economic development, job creation effort that needs to be increased regionally. Following Tuesday's meeting, Mayor Verger recently indicated that one or more additional focus group meetings can be expected before the City settles on a plan of action.
